

JANUARY

Jan 1 - HAPPY NEW YEAR!!!!

May this year bring you all the very best!!

Jan1, 1950 - Mary T. Sproul was commissioned as the first female doctor in the U.S. Navy.

Jan 1, 1962 - HAPPY 59th BIRTHDAY U.S. Navy SEAL's.

Jan 3, 1944 – CDR Frank Erickson USCG flew plasma from Brooklyn, NY to a hospital in Sandy Hook, NJ in the first recorded lifesaving flight conducted by a rotary-winged aircraft.

Jan 5, 1875 – CDR Edward Lull begins expedition to locate the best ship canal route across Panama.

Jan 5, 1968 – Lt. Clarence W. Cote becomes the first male Nurse Corps officer in the regular Navy.

Jan 10, 1956 - Establishment of the first Navy nuclear power school at Submarine Base, New London, CT.

Jan 10, 1995 -The Pentagon announced that 2,600 U.S. Marines would be deployed to Somalia for Operation Unites Shield to assist in the final withdrawal of UN peacekeeping troops from Somalia.

Jan 12, 1923 - The title "Commandant" was authorized for the service head of the Coast Guard.

Jan 15, 1974 - The first group of women ever enlisted as "regulars" in the U.S. Coast Guard began their 10-weeks of basic training at the Coast Guard Training Center in Cape May, NJ.

Jan 16, 1944 – Lt. Stewart R. Graham became the first person to make a helicopter take-off and landing aboard a ship underway at sea

Jan 16, 1991 - Operation Desert Storm, liberation of Kuwait from Iraq, begins.

Jan 18, 1951 – Marines of the 1st Marine Division began mopping-up operations against guerrillas in the Pohang area, South Korea, following the Division's return from tits epic battle with Communist Chinese troops at the Choosing Reservoir.

Jan 18 - Dr. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY!!!

Jan 20, 1914 – School for naval air training opens in Pensacola, FL.

Jan 22, 1969 – Operation Dewey Canyon, perhaps the most successful high-mobility regimental-size action of the Vietnam War, began.

Jan 27, 1945 – Commissioning of USS *Higbee* (DD-806), the first U.S. Navy ship named after a woman member of the U.S. Navy.

Jan 27, 1973 - The Paris Peace Accords is signed, ending U.S. participation in the Viet Nam War.

Jan 31, 1961 – LCDR Samuel Lee Gravely, Jr. becomes the first African-American to command a combat ship, USS Falgout.

Jan 31, 1981 – Era of Enlisted Naval Aviators ends when the last pilot retired.
